A Fair Deal

There's something in the air this time of year—it's a mix of familiar smells, children's gleeful yells and the sound of live music played under the stars. It's festival season, and throughout the Catskill Mountain Region plans are in place for another summer of tractor races, painted faces, cotton candy, crafts fairs and concerts under the stars. The major events are still ahead of us—county fairs in July and August, and through to Labor Day. Columbia and Greene counties have been designated "I Love NY Fall Festival" destinations, so you know the foliage won't be the only show at summer's end.

But have no fear, there's a sausage and pepper sandwich waiting around the corner for you at smaller June events, where the weather still betrays more than a passing familiarity with spring.

In Greene County, Hunter Mountain had barely shut down the ski lifts when it hosted the food and brew-tasting masses for April's TAP New York 2006, a celebration of more than 100 microbrews.

Full-blown festivals will return to slope side for the mountain's first-ever Cajun Country Festival on Saturday, August 5, to benefit Camp Loyaltown; and on the weekend of August 19 and 20 for Hunter's annual Celtic Festival, but there's no shortage of things to do in the meantime throughout the region.

Columbia County

On Saturday, June 10 you'll find the KinderCrafter Fair, put on by the Professional and Business Alliance on at the James Vanderpoel House, 16 Broad Street (Route 9) in the village of Kinderhook. Philmont Community Day is Saturday, June 17, and features a fishing derby at 8 am, and family events and music continues throughout the day on Main Street at Maple Avenue in the village of Philmont.

Among your pre-Independence Day chances for fireworks is the Saturday, June 24 Fireworks Extravaganza sponsored by Berkshire Bank at Lebanon Valley Speedway at dusk.

Delaware County

The Meredith Dairy Fest, held in East Meredith the weekend of June 10 and 11 from 10 am to 5 pm both days kicks off Delaware County's festival season. Dutchess County

featured, along with vendors and rides for children. The festival runs Thursday through Saturday from 11 am to 11 pm and Sunday from noon to 8 pm. There is no charge to attend.

Greene County

A weekend-long Mountain Jam returns to Hunter Mountain the weekend of June 3 and 4, featuring a line up of more than 20 bands on two stages. Featured bands and artists to perform at this year's Fest include 2005 veterans Gov't Mule, Robert Randolph and the Family Band and Medeski, Martin and Wood, plus newcomers Michael Franti & Spearhead, Mike Gordon & Ramble Dove, Keller Williams, John Brown's Body, DJ Logic, Grace Potter & the Nocturnals, Benevento-Russo Duo, The Wood Brothers, Shannon McNally, Benzos, Joey Eppard and The Trapps.

Schoharie County

Richmondville Days returns for its 30th annual celebration from June 2 through 4 with the fun beginning Friday evening with a chicken barbecue and dance, running all day Saturday with breakfasts, a parade, a baby parade, a cow chip challenge, bed races, clown performances, magic, a bounce house and inflated slide, petting zoo, plus alpacas, historical events and tours. There will be a Stone Fort Volunteer Militia Revolutionary War encampment, antique cars and engines, the longest ice cream sundae, vendors, crafters, pie sale, spaghetti and roast beef dinners and music under the tent with Bred 2 B Broken, plus fireworks at dusk. On Sunday, following a church service under the tent at 10:45 am, the celebration continues until 4 pm featuring the Richmondville Historical Society pig roast and an ice cream social both beginning at noon.
